

## Evaluating News & Current Events Using Critical Media Literacy

## Questions to ask of any current event:

- Who are the subjects? What are their positions?
   Who are their supporters/detractors?
- Who is covering the story: Mainstream/corporate media or alternative/non-traditional media?
  - If mainstream: Who own the sites? What is their motivation/goal?
  - If alternative/non-traditional: What systems do they have in place that encourage us to trust their coverage?
- o What/who are the sources?
- o What is their motivation/interest?
- To whom are they writing/broadcasting (intended audience)? Via what medium?
- Evaluate language and images: Word choice?
   Emphasis? Positive/negative picture?
- Looking around your neighborhood/community, what stories are not being reported? Why do you think this is so? Can you take steps to get a story covered?

## Trusted alternative sources

- \* AlterNet.org: Both original journalism and resource for other independent media sources; independent of corporate control
- \* Mintpressnews.com: independent, investigative, and in-depth news source
- \* Free Press: Works to keep the internet free & open, curb media consolidation, protect press freedom, and ensure diverse representation in media
- \* Politico.com: Independent journalists, on the record work, emphasis on politics and policy
- Project Censored: Emphasis on free press, independent investigative journalism, cover stories "forgotten" or ignored by mainstream press
- \* Snopes.com: Website powered by researchers and writers who investigate, analyze, and evaluate rumors & innuendo; independent entity, no sponsorship (do participate in Google ads)
- \* Truth-out.org: independent, investigative journalism and critical analysis, with a focus on revealing systemic injustice
